

The survey of 5.4 million stay-at-home moms showed that assuming a 100-hour workweek (40 hours of regular work, 60 hours of overtime), they would earn an average of \$131,471 annually if they were paid for what they do. Anna Jarvis and the Mother's Day Story

In the United States, Mother's Day started nearly 150 years ago, when Anna Jarvis, an Appalachian homemaker, organized a day to raise awareness of poor health conditions in her community, a cause she believed would be best advocated by mothers. She called it "Mother's Work Day."


In 1905 when Anna Jarvis died, her daughter, also named Anna, began a campaign to memorialize the life work of her mother. Legend has it that young Anna remembered her mother saying, "I hope and pray that someone, sometime, will found a memorial mother's day. There are many days for men, but none for mothers."


Anna began to lobby prominent businessmen to support her campaign to create a special day to honor mothers. At one of the first services organized to celebrate Anna's mother in 1908, at her church in West Virginia, Anna handed out her mother's favorite flower, the white carnation.

In 1914 Anna's hard work paid off when Woodrow Wilson signed a bill recognizing Mother's Day as a national holiday. At first, people observed Mother's Day by attending church, writing letters to their mothers, and eventually, by sending cards, presents, and flowers.


With the increasing gift-giving activity, Anna became enraged. She believed that the day's sentiment was being sacrificed at the expense of greed and profit. In 1923 she filed a lawsuit, and was even arrested for disturbing the peace at a convention selling carnations. Before her death in 1948, Jarvis is said to have confessed that she regretted ever starting the mother's day tradition.
